RHONDDA Walters is an artist who "changed horses in midstream".

Her early years were devoted to music.

She topped NSW in piano and won the Music Association Scholarship for singing under her maiden name, Rhondda Baker.

She spent some time in professional theatre but after her marriage retired to devote time to her family.

When her children were in their teens, her interests turned to art.

Her paintings, drawings and collages are on show at Roseville Galleries until March 20.

Rhondda, once a pupil and now teaching partner of Desiderius Orban, has had paintings hung in the Wynne exhibition and in six Blake exhibitions.

Orban has described her as "an excellent artist".

"She is my teaching partner," he said. "The only other teachers in my school have been John Olsen and John Ogburn.

"Rhondda's works are on a highly creative, personal level and this will ensure her a position among the important artists of our time in Australia."
